New African Histories promotes research that boldly transgresses boundaries. We seek manuscripts that develop innovative, multidimensional, and multidisciplinary ways of understanding the meanings and makings of Africa's past by challenging the operative categories of the field—whether thematic (social, cultural, political, intellectual, gender), chronological (precolonial, colonial, postcolonial) or political (ethnic, national, regional).

Building directly on the important accomplishments of social history, the series charts new directions in the reconstruction of ordinary and extraordinary lives. Since the 1980s, historians have explored the histories and agency of people on the social and political margins whose past had been rendered invisible. Social histories of Africa have demonstrated the ways in which binary categories—of rulers/ruled, colonizers/colonized, resistance/collaboration, and male/female—deny the complexity of people's lives. More recently, social historians have shifted their angle of vision to explore both social practice and cultural discourse and have opened up the possibility of seeing consciousness and politics as parts of everyday experience.

This new series from Ohio University Press is thus concerned with histories that push the boundaries of the "social"—histories that are embedded in political economies and ecosystems, contested in public memories, represented in cultural landscapes. The editors seek multivalent and textured discussions of the ways in which power relations permeate every dimension of social and cultural life. We seek contributions that are methodologically creative, theoretically adventurous, and intent upon developing alternative archives and new bodies of sources.

The editors invite submission of proposals that fit the definition of the series and push the boundaries of knowledge in new ways. We will publish monographs and occasional edited collections based on original research. All proposals should be submitted to directly to the press c/o:




