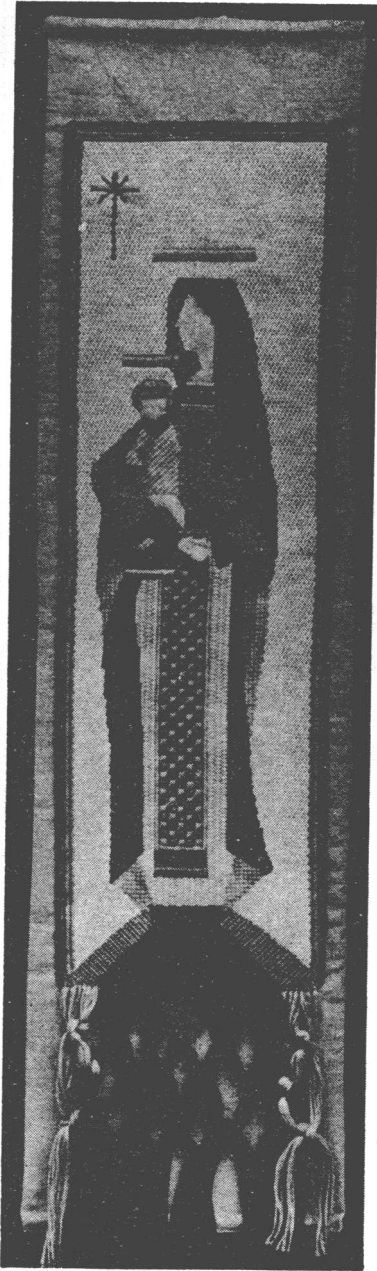

For the past forty years Hans Baron, one of the world's most influential Renaissance scholars, has been making contributions to Italian Renaissance historiography. His interpretation of the course of Florentine history, as well as his various essays dealing with other problems of early modern Europe, from Venetian chronicles to German political and social history during the Reformation, will long remain indispensable to all students of the period. In this book a group of younger students of early modern Europe offer their tribute to Hans Baron, a scholar whose work they esteem and a man whose friendship they value. Contributing to an understanding of the Renaissance from its origins to the mid-seventeenth century, the thirty-six studies have been prepared by scholars representing twenty-eight universities in England, Scotland, Italy, Germany, Canada, and the United States. No one in Renaissance studies can afford to be unfamiliar with the new, fresh interpretations of history provided in this volume.

Religion and the Rise of the American City

The New York City Mission Movement, 1812-1870

By CARROLL SMITH ROSENBERG. The city mission movement provides the unifying theme in this study of how religious sentiment, poverty, and the growth of cities interacted to shape the patterns of benevolence in nineteenth-century America. Professor Rosenberg first treats the period from 1812 to 1837 and then takes the story up through the dislocation of the war and postwar period. She focuses on such organizations as the New York Female Moral Reform Society as bases for studying the city and professionalization of benevolent and religious activities of the period. \$10.50
