## T H E C O N T R I B U T O R S

ALEXANDER ECKSTEIN, Research Associate at the Russian Research Center, Harvard University, was formerly an economist in the Division of Research for the Far East in the State Department. He collaborated with Professor W. W. Rostow on the forthcoming study, *Prospects for Communist China*, and is now preparing a monograph on the national product of mainland China.

ROBERT C. TUCKER is Consultant to the Social Science Division of the RAND Corporation. He returned to the United States in 1953 after eight years in the American Embassy in Moscow, where, from 1949 to 1953, he was Editor of the Joint Press Reading Service.

JOHN H. HERZ is Associate Professor of Government at the City College of New York. The author of *Political Realism and Political Idealism* (1951) and (with G. M. Carter) *Major Foreign Powers* (1952), he is currently engaged in a reappraisal of some basic concepts of international politics under a grant from the Rockefeller Foundation.

GEORGE E. LICHTBLAU is a labor economist specializing in international labor problems. Formerly employed by the Division of Foreign Labor Conditions in the Department of Labor, he worked on Indochinese and Indonesian affairs.

SIR LEWIS NAMIER is a Fellow of the British Academy and a member of the Editorial Board of the *History of Parliament*. He was Professor of Modern History at the University of Manchester from 1931 to 1953. Among his recent publications are *Europe in Decay, 1936-1940* (1950), *In the Nazi Era* (1952), and *Avenues of History* (1953).

RAYMOND A. BAUER is Lecturer on Social Psychology in the Department of Social Relations, Harvard University, and Research Associate of the Russian Research Center at Harvard and of the Center for International Studies at M.I.T. He is the author of *The New Man in Soviet Psychology* (1952) and of a forthcoming volume tentatively titled *Nine Soviet Portraits*.

F. D. HOLZMAN, Associate Professor of Economics, University of Washington, has been a Research Fellow of the Russian Research Center at Harvard and an economist in the Office of International Finance in the Treasury Department. His monograph, *Soviet Taxation: Financial Problems of a Planned Economy*, will be published soon.

GUY J. PAUKER is Lecturer on Government, Harvard University. He is engaged in research in connection with the Committee on Comparative Politics, Social Science Research Council; the Values Study, Laboratory of Social Relations, Harvard University; and the Economic and Political Development Project, Center for International Studies, M.I.T.
