The Hague Convention on Choice of Court Agreements applies to international litigation and is designed to ensure that parties' choice of court agreements in international commercial transactions and other international civil matters are honored.

Certified Award to Claimant Maria Victoria Altmann, Claims Resolution Tribunal, In Re Holocaust Victim Assets Litigation, Case No. CV96-4849, Introductory Note by Don Wallace, Jr.

The Claims Resolution Tribunal ("CRT") concluded that a Swiss Bank actively assisted in the forced sale of the claimants' shares by unlawfully transferring those shares that were held by the Bank to a designated Nazi purchaser at a small fraction of the shares' value, without having obtained unanimous consent of the parties to the Syndicate agreement. The CRT's award, of approximately \$22 million, has been the largest one given since the \$1.25 billion fund was established by a consortium of Swiss banks.


NAFTA Chapter Eleven Arbitral Tribunal: Methanex Corporation v. United States of America, Final Award on Jurisdiction and Merits, Introductory Note by Barton Legum The tribunal dismissed all of Methanex's claims and held that Methanex, as the unsuccessful party as to both jurisdiction and the merits of its claim, would bear the costs of the arbitration, in the total amount of \$1,071,539.21 (including interest). Methanex claimed that California regulations banning the sale and supply of California gasoline that has been produced with MTBE were discriminatory, sham environmental regulations put into place in order to benefit and protect the U.S. ethanol industry.

Supreme Court of Canada: Mugesera v. Canada (Minister of Citizenship and Immigration), Introductory Note by Roberto A. Godoy


The Supreme Court of Canada ("The Court") found that Mr. Mugesera's speech fulfilled the requirements of persecution as a crime against humanity, and held that Mugesera was therefore inadmissible to Canada. The Court, which had previously held in Finta that all crimes against humanity require discriminatory intent, reviewed its jurisprudence in light of recent decisions of international criminal courts such as the ICTR and ICTY.

#### **Guidelines for Submission of Documents**

The ILM Office welcomes any effort to bring suitable documents to the Office's attention. Electronic files or web links are required for publication, although printed texts can be used for initial deliberations regarding republication.

The authenticity (i.e. official version status) of submitted documents must be easily verifiable. This is facilitated by submitting files or print versions which are clearly attributable to the original source, or by providing links to documents on the original source's official website.

If the official version of a document is not available in English, an unofficial translation is acceptable. The original text must accompany such a translation.

#### **Introductory Notes**

Introductory Notes are brief articles from one to three pages in length which are intended to provide background information for a document reproduced in ILM.

For example, an Introductory Note for a treaty might include a short history of the negotiations, the dates of signature and entry into force. An Introductory Note for legislation would give its history and international significance, while one for judicial proceedings would provide the background of the case.

#### **Acceptance of Materials and Corrections**

Print submissions cannot be returned. Translators and others submitting material will be notified of the acceptance of their document for publication.

Once a translation or Introductory Note has been accepted for reproduction, The American Society of International Law will send a publication agreement to the author.

Translators and Introductory Note Authors shall be acknowledged in *International Legal Materials*.

In some cases minor editorial or typographical alterations may be made without contacting the author or translator. Major corrections will be sent to the author or translator for approval. Corrected Introductory Notes or translations must be returned within the time specified.
