The Interface Between the NHS and the Independent Sector in the Care of Older People with Mental Illness Occasional Paper 45

A joint working group of the Royal College of Psychiatrists' Faculty of the Psychiatry of Old Age and the Independent Health Care Association has produced this occasional paper, which was published by the Royal College of Psychiatrists earlier this year.

Four hundred and fifty thousand mentally ill and physically disabled people now live in residential care in the UK. This paper reviews the reasons for this massive expansion over the past twenty years and looks at some of the major care issues this has thrown up. It gives recommendations as to how some of these issues, for example, adequate medical care, should be tackled. It then goes on to give clear guidelines for the discharge of mentally frail people into residential care, which could form the basis of standards suitable for clinical audit. Finally, there is a discussion paper on confidentiality and residential care, which similarly could form the basis of standards for audit.

This paper should be of value to all those involved in the commissioning, delivery, regulation and inspection of health care services for elderly people with mental health problems.
