TWO BOOKS BY CONRAD PEPLER O.P.

THE THREE DEGREES

Many treatises have been composed to reveal the intricacies of the way to Heaven in terms of the 'three ways' and the division is hoary with age yet quite inescapable in its simplicity. But each age must have its own idiom, its own approach to the fundamentals of our Faith and here the author, founder and for many years editor of The Life of the Spirit, examines mysticism in terms which are clear and lucid for twentieth-century students. In the first part of his study he has considered the foundations of the mystical life, culminating in eucharistic and mystical union, and then in part two considers the structure of mysticism; what it is; a study of mystical theology; psychologies of mysticism; the necessity for Christian mysticism; and the unity of mystical experience. Coming shortly.

RICHES DESPISED

The author here tries to achieve a balance between nature and grace to show how the full Christian life as realized by the Masters may still be attained in this twentieth-century age. He seeks to correct the view that nature is utterly corrupt and that if man would be perfect he must repress all his natural inclinations, and yet on the other hand he does not seek to pretend that human nature is so essentially good that it only requires a few minor adjustments to make it a perfect receptacle for divine grace. He considers this problem of balance against the background of our modern industrial conditions and shows the dangers for even the staunchest Christians in this type of life. Finally, he makes some suggestions as to how modern man, living in an artificial civilization, may still live an integrated Christian life. For publication in August. approx. 15s.
