The American Society of Law, Medicine & Ethics (ASLME) is an interdisciplinary educational association whose mission is to provide high-quality debate and critical insights on issues facing the community of professionals at the intersection of law, health care, policy, and ethics.

PUBLICATIONS

Membership in ASLME includes annual subscriptions to two quarterly publications: *The Journal of Law, Medicine & Ethics* (formerly *Law, Medicine & Health Care*) and the *American Journal of Law & Medicine*.

The Journal of Law, Medicine & Ethics is a professional, peer reviewed quarterly read by more than 6,500 doctors, lawyers, nurses, ethicists, hospital administrators, allied health professionals, and students. *JLME* provides well-written and often controversial articles on such timely topics as health care quality, cost, and access, managed care, ethics committees, informed consent, assisted dying, genetics, reproductive health, and public health. Issues also feature reviews of significant policy decisions, books, and recent health law developments.

The Winter 1995 issue features papers on the legal and clinical implications of the Genome Project as well as panel commentaries on model genetics privacy legislation. The Spring 1996 issue presents on research advance directives as well as articles on informed consent. The Fall 1996 issue will present papers on legal and clinical issues arising from the Second and Ninth Circuit Courts of Appeals decisions.

The *American Journal of Law & Medicine* is a law review co-published with the Boston University School of Law. *AJLM* was founded to fulfill the need for a scholarly journal dedicated to improving communication between legal and medical professionals. Each issue contains in-depth articles and case notes—on broad themes relating to health law and policy, and to the legal, ethical, and economic aspects of medical practice, research, and education—and selected book reviews and health law court decisions.

The 1995 Winter issue contains papers on nursing homes and selection and retention of physicians under ERISA. The 1996 Spring issue contains papers on malpractice liability and insurance coverage.

CONFERENCES

The Society sponsors continuing education conferences. Each conference includes panel debates, roundtable discussions, and workshops. Conferences are accredited for legal, medical, and nursing credit, with other credit arranged as is appropriate. Registration fees includes all conference materials, and members may register at reduced rates.

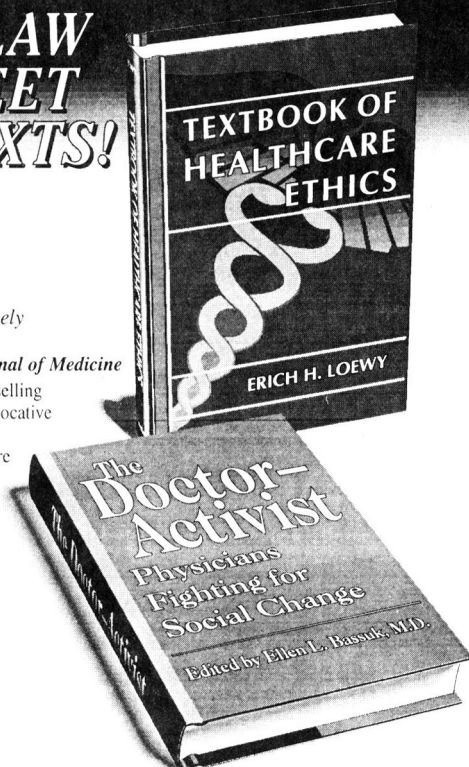

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SUBMISSION OF MANUSCRIPTS

The editors encourage the submission of manuscripts on a wide range of medicolegal topics for publication in the JOURNAL. Acceptable subjects include health law and policy; legal, ethical, social, and economic aspects of medical practice, education, and research; health-related insurance; and other important or interesting subjects involving the relationship of the life sciences to the social sciences and humanities. The JOURNAL is interdisciplinary. Contributions from specialists in a variety of disciplines are welcomed.

GENERAL FORM: Manuscripts must be in typed form and single-sided. They must be double-spaced, with liberal margins. Manuscripts should be submitted in *triplicate*, i.e., an original and two photocopies. The title of the paper and the author's name and address should be given only on the covering sheet. Papers should exceed forty pages in length. If a paper is accepted, the author will be expected to provide a diskette copy of the manuscript either in MS Word 2.0, 6.0, or WordPerfect 5.1, 6.0.

ABSTRACTS: A short abstract (normally of no more than 200 words), succinctly summarizing the content of the manuscript, should accompany the manuscript on a separate sheet. If a manuscript is accepted, its abstract will be published with the paper.

REFERENCES: Footnotes to sources must be numbered consecutively and double-spaced. All footnotes should conform to *A Uniform System of Citation* (15th ed.), which is published and distributed by the Harvard Law Review Association, Gannett House, Cambridge, Massachusetts 02138. Nonlawyers unfamiliar with this system should follow the citation form accepted in their discipline. If such a paper is accepted, the editors of the JOURNAL will work by arrangement with the author to convert the footnotes into the proper form.

ILLUSTRATIONS: All illustrations, tables, graphs, and charts must be numbered and given suitable legends. Authors must indicate in the manuscript the appropriate positions of such graphics. Authors will be expected to provide either a suitable diskette graphics file or a camera-ready copy for each graphic.

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PROOF PAGES AND AUTHOR REPRINTS: Authors will be given *one* set of proof pages prior to publication. Proof pages will incorporate textual revisions discussed between the assigned editor and the author. Reprint order forms will accompany the proof pages. All orders must be prepaid.

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
