**Ellen Mickiewicz,** professor of political science at Emory University, has been named president-elect of the American Association for the Advancement of Slavic Studies.


**Daniel Patrick Moynihan,** U.S. Senator from New York, has been elected to membership in the American Antiquarian Society.






