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

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The Renaissance Society of America was organized on January 30, 1954, at Columbia University and was incorporated as a nonprofit society under the laws of the State of New York on April 30, 1954. Its purpose is the advancement of learning in the field of Renaissance studies, and especially the promotion of interchange among the various fields of specialization, such as the visual arts, music, Latin and the modern literatures, classical scholarship, the sciences, law, philosophy, religion, theology, political, economic and social history, and any other field of learning which may deepen or broaden understanding of the Renaissance period.

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
