Previlegia nostri ordinis

i. Bull of Pope Lucius III confirming to Hugh, abbot of Prémontré,¹ and the other abbots and canons of the Premonstratensian order, their laws and privileges in perpetuity. 10 March 1184 (by modern reckoning).²

Lucius episcopus servus servorum Dei dilectis filiis Hugonii^a abbati Premonstrat[ens]i et ceteris abbatibus et canoniciis Premonstrat[ensis] ordinis, tam presentibus quam futuris, regularem vitam professis in perpetuum.

In eminenti apostolice sedis specula, licet immeriti, disponente domino constituti, pro singulorum statu solliciti esse compellimur, et ea sincere tenemur amplecti que ad incrementum religionis pertinent^b et ad virtutum spectant^c ornatum, quatinus religiosorum quies ab omni sit perturbacione secura et a jugo mundane oppressionis servetur illesa, cum apostolica fuerit tuicione munita. Attendentes itaque quomodo religio et ordo noster,^d multa refulgens gloria meritorum et gracia redolens sanctitatis palmites suos a mari usque ad mare extenderit, ipsum ordinem et commensales^e domos eiusdem ordinis apostolice proteccionis presidio duximus confovendas et presenti privilegio^f muniendas. Ea propter, dilecti in Domino filii, vestris justis postulacionibus benignius annuentes, ad exemplum^g felicis recordacionis Alexandri pape predecessoris nostri, universas regulares institutiones et disposiciones, quas de communi concensu vel maioris et sanioris partis fecistis, sicut inferius denotatur, auctoritate apostolica roboramus et presentis scripti patrocinio^h communimus. Videlicet ut ordo canonicus, quemadmodum in Premonstratensi ecclesia secundum beati Augustini regulam et dispositionem recolende memorie Norberti quandam Premonstratensisⁱ ordinis institutoris et successorum suorum in candido habitu constitutus esse dinoscitur, per omnes eiusdem^j ordinis ecclesias perpetuis temporibus inviolabiliter

observetur, et eedem penitus observancie, i[.]dem quoque libri qui ad divinum officium pertinent, ab omnibus eiusdem ordinis ecclesiis uniformiter teneantur, nec aliqua ecclesia vel persona ordinis nostri^k aduersus communia ipsius ordinis instituta privilegium aliquod postulare vel obtentum audacter^l quomodolibet retinere. Nulla eciam ecclesiarum eius quam genuit quamlibet terreni comodi exactionem^m imponat. Set tantum pater abbas curam de profectu tam abbatis filii quam fratum domus illiusⁿ habeat. Preterea omnes abbates ordinis nostri^r singulis annis ad generale capitulum Premonstratum,^s post posita omni^t occasione, convenient, illis solis exceptis^u quos a labore vie corporis retardaverit infirmitas; qui tamen idoneum^v delegare debent^w nuncium per quem necessitas et causa remoracionis sue capitulo fuerit constitutus. In quo nimirum^x capitulo presedente abbate Premonstratensi ceterisque confidentibus^y et in spiritu Dei cooperantibus, de hiis que ad edificacionem animarum, ad instrucionem morum et ad informacionem virtutum atque incrementum regularis discipline spectabunt, sermo diligens habeatur. Porro de omnibus questionibus^z et querelis, tam spiritualibus quam temporalibus, que in ipso capitulo proposito fuerint, illud teneatur irrefragabiliter^{aa} et observetur quod abbas Premonstratensis^{ab} cum hiis qui ad sanioris consilii et magis idonei apparuerint juste ac provide judicabit. Sane si abbas^{ac} aliquis vestri ordinis infamis vel inutilis aut ordinis sui prevaricator inventus fuerit, et prius per abbatem patrem suum aut per nuncios eius ammonitus suum corrigeret et emendare delictum neglexerit, aut cedere, si amovendus fuerit, sponte noluerit, auctoritate generalis capituli deponatur; et depositus sine dilacione ad aliquam ordinis domum in qua, auxilio capituli [fo. 2r] generalis et prece propria, graciam introitus invenire potuerit, revertatur,^{ad} in obedientia abbatis, sicut ceteri fratres ipsius domus, firmiter permansurus. 2. Hugh II, abbot of Prémontré, writes to all prelates in the church who know the text of the privilege of Pope Lucius III. The original copy of this bull is to be kept at the mother abbey of the order at Prémontré. Transcripts will be kept in other abbeys belonging to the order, with the seal of the general chapter attached. 10 March 1184 (by modern reckoning)–1189.

[CHARTERS OF ROBERT SON OF RANULPH
AND HIS FAMILY]

3. Notification to Richard, bishop of Coventry,¹ and to all the sons of holy mother church of the gift in free, pure, and perpetual alms by Robert son of Ranulph to God and St Mary and St Thomas the Martyr,² and to the brothers of the Premonstratensian order, for erecting an abbey, of the place called Beauchief in Doreheseles,³ which is the land contained in the area from Greenhill by Clebern's assart to the assarts of Gervase, Gamel, Hacon, and Gerard, and by the hedge to the brow of the hill called Doreheg, and then down to Roger's assart, and by his hedge beyond the water by the lane to Robert the forester's assart, and then by the road which leads back to Greenhill; of the churches of Norton, Alfreton, Wymeswold, and Edwalton, with all their appurtenances; and of a tenth of all his revenue, for the salvation of the souls of King Henry II and all his sons

and for the salvation of his own soul and those of all his relatives and ancestors. [1173–1176]⁴

¹ Richard Peche, bishop of Coventry 1161–1182. Derbyshire had been part of the diocese of Lichfield since the seventh century, but in 1102 the see was moved to Coventry. In the early thirteenth century it became known as Coventry and Lichfield. Beauchief lay just inside its northern border.

² Thomas Becket was murdered on 29 December 1170 and canonized on 21 February 1173; King Henry II did public penance at Becket's shrine on 12 July 1174.

Gift in free alms by Thomas Chaworth, knight, lord of Norton, to Beauchief abbey, for the maintenance of a canon to commemorate his soul and those of his family annually at the altar of the Holy Cross, of the hamlet of Greenhill in the soke of Norton and of all his serfs in the same hamlet with their lands and families in Greenhill and elsewhere; and of all his serfs in [Norton] Woodseats with their lands there, saving the lands which Thomas of the Wood and William Tinett hold by the river Sheaf. [c.1301]¹

Dedi etiam et concessi Deo et monasterio de Bello-capite praedicto, et religiosis viris abbatи et conventui ejusdem loci, duodecim solidos et octo denarios annui redditus, quos praedicti abbas et conventus mihi reddere solebant pro diversis tenementis, quae de me tenuerunt in Alfreton et Norton. Habendum et tenendum Deo et monasterio praedicto, ac religiosis viris abbatи et conventui praedictis, et eorum successoribus, in liberam, puram, et perpetuam elemosinam, cum pratis, boscis, pascuis, pasturis, moris, turbariis, quarariis,

On 1 November 1301, Thomas Chaworth received licence to alienate in mortmain to the abbey for the maintenance of a canon chaplain celebrating divine service there for the souls of Thomas, his wife, Joan, and their ancestors, 10 tofts, 11 bovates, 58 acres of land, 16 acres of wood, and 58s 6d of yearly rent in Alfreton, Norton, Greenhill, Bradway, and Woodseats (*Calendar of Patent Rolls, Edward I: 1292–1301*, p. 616; The National Archives, C 143/35/9 for the preceding inquest *ad quod damnum*). 18 and 22 perhaps represent this estate, since both gifts refer specifically to the maintenance of a chaplain to pray for Thomas's soul and those of his family. Four other charters (33, 39–41) also record a gift of premises at Greenhill and elsewhere in Norton for the maintenance of a chaplain to pray at either the altar of St Katherine or that dedicated to the Holy Cross (no dedication is mentioned in 22 or in the licence of 1301). It is possible that these other gifts were also made under the authority of the same licence. See also 47, a power of attorney dated a few weeks after the licence, which seems likely to be connected with the same business. See, too, 44 and 61.

Roger of Brailsford, rector of Dronfield, witnessed a deed there in 1281 (Staffordshire Record Office, D1229/1/6/1). Sir Thomas of Furnival IV, Sir Adam of Everingham II, Sir William of Gousil, Sir Richard of Fourness, Sir Robert of Ecclesall, Roger of Brailsford, rector of Dronfield church, William the Bret, John of Aynecourt, Roger the Breton, Simon of Reresby, John of Brimington, and Hugh of Linacre form a prominent group of witnesses who appear on a number of occasions in each other's company, although not all together at any one time. Among the charters in which some of them appear together 71 is dated 1301 (William le Bret, Roger Breton) and 38 and 44 (copy in 61) are dated 1312 (Sir Thomas, Sir Adam, Roger of Brailsford, William le Bret, John of Aynecourt, Roger the Breton, and Hugh of Linacre appear in one or the other). With members of this group the names of Stephen the Eyr and John the clerk of Stubley are also sometimes found; John son of William of Stubley witnessed a deed at Dronfield in 1280 (S. Pegge, *An Historical Account of Beauchief Abbey* (London, 1801), p. 97). John of Aynecourt was descended from Walter of Ancourt, a Norman lord from near Dieppe whose Domesday Book estates were principally in Lincolnshire and Nottinghamshire, and whose son Ralph founded Thurgaton Priory (Notts), to which he gave the benefices of Elmton and Langwith (Derbs); a junior branch held several Derbyshire properties in Scarsdale wapentake until

the male line failed in the mid-fourteenth century (G. Turbitt, *A History of Derbyshire*, 4 vols (Cardiff, 1999) II, p. 483). In 37 (copy in 81), John of Ayncourt is described as a knight but here and in 33, 38–41, 44, 61 he is not so described, although some other witnesses are; he was recorded at the 1281 Derbyshire eyre (A. Hopkinson (ed.), *The Rolls of the 1281 Derbyshire Eyre*, Derbyshire Record Society 27 (2000), p. 87) and, together with William le Bret, Roger le Breton, Stephen le Eyr, Hugh of Linacre, and John of Stubley, witnessed a grant made to Thomas son of Roger of Gotham by Thomas Chaworth on 3 May 1308 (T.W. Hall and A.H. Thomas, *A Descriptive Catalogue of the Charters . . . Forming the Jackson Collection at the Sheffield Public Reference Library* (Sheffield, 1914), no. 299). Gift in free alms by Thomas Chaworth, knight, lord of Norton, to Beauchief abbey, for the maintenance of a canon to commemorate his soul and those of his family at the altar of St Katherine, of his hamlet of Greenhill in the soke of Norton with Greenhill Moor, all services of its free tenants, all its lands and tenements held in villeinage, and all his villeins with their families and chattels; and of all lands and tenements which Hugh of Little Norton held in villeinage at Little Norton and (Norton) Woodseats and the same Hugh with his family and their chattels. Also, quitclaim of an annual rent of 12s 8d which the abbey pay him for diverse tenements in Alfreton and Norton. Also, gift in free alms of all lands and tenements held in villeinage in (Norton) Woodseats and all his villeins there with their families and their chattels, saving the lands which Thomas of the wood and William Tinet hold by the river Sheaf.

The abbey may use any land in Thomas's waste to maintain their ditches and houses and may dig, remove, and quarry whatever they need on Thomas's waste as well as on that of their own lands. They may also enclose and cultivate these wastes. [1247–1316]¹

Gift in free alms by Thomas Chaworth, knight, lord of Norton, to Beauchief abbey and its tenants of licence to dig for and carry away coal for their use and profit, provided the tenants have a licence from the abbey to do so, as much in the lands assigned for the support of a chaplain for the Mass of St Mary at Alfreton and the lands held by the abbey as in their own lands and wastes in the sokes of Alfreton and Norton; and of the right to clear the abbey's arable lands and those of their tenants from corn marigolds¹ according to the custom of the sokes of Alfreton and Norton. The abbey may also arrest its tenants and impose damages on them as Thomas and his ancestors used to do. [1247-1316]²

Alan's house, and then up this road to Alan's assart, and then to the assarts of Robert and Peter and back up to the Greenhill; of the churches of Norton, Alfreton, Wymeswold, and Edwalton; of the mill of Norton; of Hugh's assart near Meersbrook with 1 toft in (Norton) Lees; of 1 toft near Alan's house; of a tenth of all his pannage; and of 2 bovates in Wymeswold from his demesne with 1 toft containing 3 acres, *viz.* on the west 8 selions at Robbewong, 6 selions at Milnehill, 5 selions at Netherbrombergh, 11 selions at Longbenlondeshend, 6 selions at Martynhau, 3 selions at Mikylwaterlondeshendes, 4 selions at Hungurhill, and on the east 4 selions at Mousewelehende, 8 selions at Marwaterlandes, 5 selions at Marthegravegate, 9 selions at Comberdale, 4 selions below the roads, 6 selions to the south of Rykesyk, 9 selions at Smalhengsikeshende.

[10; see 22] **The gift in free alms by him, Thomas Chaworth, of the annual rent of 18s which Robert the redsmith paid for the tenement in Swanwick near Alfreton; of 1 assart with a toft and croft which Roger the smith held in Birchwood in the soke of Alfreton; of 1 bovate which Adam of Birchwood held in Birchwood; of all the land which Roger the bercher held in the soke of Alfreton; of 1 assart called Robertrydding bordering on the abbey's assart on the common of (Norton) Lees; of a rent of 2s from the tenement which Roger Mons held in Alfreton; of a rent of 12d from the tenement which Nicholas Torald held in Alfreton; of 1 bovate which Richard Horegh held in Bradway; and of Robert of the greave, his serf, with all his family and their chattels and of the tenement in the soke of Norton.**

[11; see 23] **The gift in free alms by him, Thomas Chaworth, of the land which Richard of the moor once held in Cockshutt field which lies between the abbey's wood and the land which Winnora of Cockshutt once held from the abbey.**

[12; see 25] **The gift in free alms by him, Thomas Chaworth, of the strip called the Cliffe lying in length between the land which the abbey holds and the land which Thomas son of John of the wood held and extending from the abbey's land south to the arable land on the hill.**

[13; see 24] **The gift in free alms by him, Thomas Chaworth, of 1 toft and croft in Cockshutt which John the smith once held and 1 curtilage in Alfreton near the barn which the abbey held at the time of Robert of Lathom.**

[14; see 26] The gift in free alms by him, Thomas Chaworth, of the land called the Qwytekere; of 12 acres in Barsfelde; and of the strip which Peter the weaver held near the land of Simon of the Storthes in Alfreton.

[15; see 27] The gift in free alms by him, Thomas Chaworth, of 1 assart which Robert Forester once held near the abbey's sheepfold; of 3 acres of arable which Robert of Childre held below the cloister; of 8½ acres which Ranulph of Storthes held and which lie between the land of Samson and the land of Robert Scarlet; and of 5½ acres which Richard Edward once held between the land of Robert Scarlet and the road leading to Birchwood in Alfreton.

[16; see 28] The gift in free alms by him, Thomas Chaworth, of the land which Thomas of the Wood and William Tyne held in (Norton) Woodseats, saving the lands, meadows, and woods which the same Thomas and William hold by the river Sheaf.

[17; see 29] The gift in free alms by him, Thomas Chaworth, of 1 bovate with tofts, crofts, and buildings which Richard Hore once held in Bradway.

[18; see 30] The gift in free alms by him, Thomas Chaworth, of an annual rent of 5s for the land called the land of Robert the fletcher which they held in the soke of Norton.

[19; see 31] The gift in free alms by him, Thomas Chaworth, of free passage for the animals, goods, and carriages of the abbey at Marnham ferry.

[20; see 32] The gift in free alms by him, Thomas Chaworth, of 1 strip of land on the west side of Alfreton Hall.

[21; see 60] The quitclaim by him, Thomas Chaworth, of the service of gilt spurs which they pay him annually for the land and tenement which they have in Wymeswold of the gift of Roger of Alfreton.

[22; see 33] The gift in free alms by him, Thomas Chaworth, for the maintenance of a canon to commemorate his soul and those of his family at the altar of St Katherine, of his hamlet of Greenhill in the soke of Norton with Greenhill Moor, all services of its free tenants, all its serfs with their lands and tenements held in bondage, their families and chattels; of Hugh of Little Norton with all his family and their chattels and the tenement which he held in bondage at Little Norton; of the rent of 12s 8d which the abbey pays for diverse tenements in Alfreton and Norton; and of all his serfs in Woodseats near Norton with all their

which Thomas of the Wood and William Tinet hold by the

and of an annual rent of 12s 8d which the abbey pay for diverse tenements in Alfreton and Norton. [c.1301]¹

42. Gift in free alms by Thomas Chaworth, knight, to Beauchief abbey of $\frac{1}{2}$ rod near the mill of Aston or Hazlehurst west of the waterway of the mill for transferring the mill from the east of the waterway to the west for the great easement of the mill to be erected in that

place which Roger Pykard held.¹ The abbey quitclaimed to Thomas 1 rod of arable land which they had in Aston field. [1270–1315]

Confirmation by Thomas Chaworth, knight, son of the late Sir William Chaworth, knight, to Beauchief abbey of all lands, tenements, rents etc. which the abbey had from Sir Thomas Chaworth, his grandfather, and from all his other ancestors in the vills of Wymeswold and Marnham and in the sokes of Norton and Alfreton. Made at Beauchief on 11 November 1312.¹

Gift in free alms by Thomas Chaworth, knight, to Beauchief abbey of the windmill which he built near Aston which was seen to harm the abbey's mill at Aston, with all the suit of mulfure of Aston, 1 rod for a sufficient place around the mill, and sufficient easement for roads and paths in his fee. Thomas promises to build no more mills in Norton or Aston or the surrounding area. It is permitted for the abbey to transfer the windmill elsewhere in his fee.

It is permitted for Thomas to grind his corn from Norton at the abbey's mill without any toll. [1260–1315]¹

46. Notification by Thomas de Chaworth, knight, lord of Norton, that because he has confirmed all charters, writings, and muniments of gifts, grants, and confirmations of lands, tenements, and church advowsons made by him and his ancestors to Beauchief abbey, he

now wills and grants that if the abbot and convent, their successors, or their men and tenants commit any offence or transgression against him, his heirs, or their men and tenants, then they must answer to him, his heirs, or their men and tenants in his courts of Norton and Alfreton, held at either Norton church if the transgression is committed there or Alfreton church if the transgression is committed there. [1312–1315]¹

[AGREEMENT BETWEEN SIR THOMAS CHAWORTH I
AND ROBERT OF LATHOM]

66. Agreement made between Sir Thomas Chaworth and Sir Robert of Lathom. Thomas granted to Robert the marriage-right of whichever of his sons was his heir, or

if they should all predecease him then of whichever of his daughters were unmarried on the day that his last son and heir dies. So that Thomas's heir is married to Joan, Robert's daughter, or to another of his legitimate daughters if the said Joan should die before the said marriage is contracted. If Thomas or any of his heirs oppose this agreement then Thomas grants that Robert should have all the lands and tenements which Nicholas of Lathom, kinsman of Thomas, once gave him and which came to Joan of Lathom, Nicholas's mother, by hereditary right, *viz.* those lands in Alfreton, Norton, Osberton,¹ Edwalton, Wymeswold, Tokeby,² and elsewhere which Thomas has demised to Robert of Lathom³ on his death by a chirograph made between them, so that they be held by Robert and his heirs borne by Joan, his wife, daughter of Adam of Milum. Gift in free alms by Ralph son and heir of Robert of Ecclesall to Beauchief abbey, for the maintenance of a canon with a clerk to celebrate in the chapel of Ecclesall,¹ for the maintenance of the said chapel, and for the maintenance of the canons who say a daily prayer at the end of each chapter for the souls of his family, of his mill of Ecclesall² with a pond, waterway, and all suits and multure, saving multure of his house in Ecclesall and fishing in the mill pond, until he or his heirs provide the canons with an annual rent of 6 silver marks in exchange for the said mill. The canons are permitted to take timber from Ralph's wood in Ecclesall³ for repairing the mill and its land. In snow and floods the canons may celebrate Mass for the souls of his family at Beauchief. They must not send to Ecclesall chapel any canon whom he does not like. If anything happens to the chapel of Ecclesall the canons must maintain a canon or secular chaplain in the church of Sheffield.⁴ If the canons wish to withdraw the said chantry

**then they shall be excommunicated and lose the said mill.

112. Agreement made between Ralph son of Robert of Ecclesall on the one part and Beauchief abbey on the other. Ralph gave his mill of Ecclesall to Beauchief abbey in free alms with its pond, waterway, and all suits and multure, saving multure of his house in Ecclesall and fishing in the mill pond, as long as they provide the annual rent of 4 silver marks. The canons were permitted to take timber from Ralph's wood in Ecclesall for repairing the mill and its land. The canons will take 4 marks or its value in multure annually with all of the residue of the multure to go to Ralph. When the canons are so paid the mill will revert

back to Ralph. The canons are held to Ralph for the said 4 marks and $\frac{1}{2}$ mark assigned in Attercliffe¹ to maintain a canon to celebrate in the chapel of Ecclesall for the souls of his family except in stormy weather and floods. They must not send to Ecclesall chapel any canon whom he does not like. If anything happens to the chapel of Ecclesall the canons must maintain a canon or secular chaplain in the church of Sheffield. If the canons wish to withdraw the said chantry then they shall be excommunicated and lose the said mill. Chirograph. [1250–1280]

The

canons, who gave Roger 8s in silver for this grant, shall render to him 2d annually. [1200-1230]¹

Garratt, *Derbyshire Feet of Fines*, p. 69, records that in 1398 Ralph Barker of Dore bought the advowson of Dronfield church from John Bassett, knight, and his wife, Joan (see also 50). Turbutt, *Derbyshire*, II, p. 720, says that the benefice of Dronfield was appropriated to Beauchief in 1399.

Some evidence of the abbey's role in supplicating for the souls of deceased commoners in this part of Derbyshire is found in the grant of a licence on 8 May 1409 to Henry Coke chaplain, Thomas Rodes chaplain, and John de Normanton of Chesterfield to grant in mortmain to the abbey 3 messuages, 6 cottages, 60 acres of land, 12 acres of meadow, and 46s of rent in Chesterfield, Brampton, Newbold, Boythorpe, Hasland, and Heath, all worth 41s 8d yearly, for the maintenance of a chaplain to celebrate divine service daily for the souls of Hugh Draper of Chesterfield and Cecily de Thomworth, sometime his wife, and Cecily Leche, late his wife, in the church of All Saints, Chesterfield (*Calendar of Patent Rolls, Henry IV, 4: 1408–1413*, pp. 89–90); Hugh le Drapier, formerly an owner of tenements in the new market of Chesterfield, also appears in a charter of Sir Thomas Chaworth IV dated 26 March 1412 (Hall and Thomas, *Jackson Collection*, p. 122). On 23 November 1406 the abbey had paid £10 for a licence to acquire lands and rents in mortmain to the value of £10 yearly (*Calendar of Patent Rolls, Henry IV, 3: 1405–1408*, p. 278).

220. Final concord made in the court of the Lord King at York in the third week after Easter 1328¹ between John of Wigley, plaintiff, and John son of Walter of Buildwas² and Alice his wife, deforcians, concerning 1 messuage, 1 bovate, and 2 acres in Wigley and Brampton. John son of Walter and Alice acknowledged that the aforesaid tenements were John of Wigley's by right by their gift. John of Wigley gave John son of Walter and Alice 100s in silver for this acknowledgement. [1328]

Three of Ralph’s charters and one of his son’s were confirmed in 1316 (Appendix II, nos 30–33); none survives in the Cartulary. The income received by the abbey from temporalities in Handley and Wadshelf was valued in the *Taxatio* in 1291 at 40s (<http://www.hrionline.ac.uk/taxatio>).
