Bibliographies from Louvain

Two cyclostyled bibliographies (61 pp. each) have recently been produced by the Institut d'Étude des Pays en Développement of Louvain: 'Problèmes politiques de l'Afrique', by Professor Guy Malengreau, assisted by M. P. Demunter; and 'Théorie générale des Institutions politiques des Pays en Développement', by Professor Guy Malengreau, assisted by MM. A. Lecointre and J. Agreda.

The first lists bibliographies under such headings as Ouvrages généraux sur l'Afrique; l'Afrique politique traditionnelle; l'Afrique coloniale; l'Afrique coloniale en marche vers l'Indépendance; Institutions et Régimes politiques — Administration de l'Afrique indépendante; Vie politique; Relations internationales. The second bibliography deals with Latin America, Asia, and the Middle East as well as Africa. A section is devoted to 'Institutions politiques de l'Afrique', and entries concerning Africa appear under the specific headings of Nationalisme, Systèmes électifs, Partis politiques, Forces politiques et groupes de pression, and Administration.

'Research on Agricultural Development in East Africa', by Peter F. M. McLoughlin

THIS is the third in a series of monographs sponsored by the American Universities Research Program of the Agricultural Development Council. Its purpose is to classify and evaluate research on rural development in East Africa (Kenya, Uganda, Tanzania) and to indicate areas and priorities of future research. While the major focus is on the economics of agricultural development, research in associated fields has also been included. A classified list of the more significant items is in Appendix I, and a list of basic bibliographical sources in Appendix II.

Recent Reprints of Books on Africa

WE have received the following recent reprints from Frank Cass:

The Rise of our East African Empire, by Frederick D. Lugard (two volumes, £15. 15s.). This was first published in 1893; the first volume deals with Nyasaland and Eastern Africa, with chapters on commerce, slave trade, and sport; the second with Uganda, with chapters on administration, past and future, and suggestions for dealing with that country. Both volumes are illustrated with photographs, drawings, and maps.

The Lower Niger and its Tribes, by Major Arthur Glyn Leonard (£5. 5s.). This was first published in 1906 and has a Preface by A. C. Haddon. It is an account of religious beliefs and witchcraft among the Ibibio, Ibo, Ijaw, and Edo peoples, with references to other groups living in the area.

Native Races and their Rulers, by C. L. Temple (75s.). First published in 1918. Reviewed in *Africa*, October 1968, pp. 480-1, by A. H. M. Kirk-Greene.

The Sultanate of Bornu, by Dr. A. Schultze (84s.). First published in 1913. Reviewed in this issue of *Africa*, p. 81, by A. H. M. Kirk-Greene.

Professor Daniel Jones

WE regret to record the death of Professor Daniel Jones, Professor Emeritus of Phonetics at University College, London, and author of many publications on phonetics and on the Sechuana language. Professor Jones was a member of the Institute's committee formed in 1926 by Professors Westermann and Delafosse, the first Directors, to establish a practical orthography for African languages. Their work resulted in the publication of *A Practical Orthography of African Languages* which has since been extensively adopted. The alphabet proposed consisted of twenty-six roman letters which were given fixed values, corresponding closely to those of the International Phonetic Association and to common practice in Africa, with, however, a bias in favour of the latter, and including letters which up to then had been a matter of controversy. Professor Jones co-operated closely with the Institute on its programmes of research on African languages over many years. He also wrote the Foreword to Westermann and Ward's *Practical Phonetics for Students of African Languages*, first published by the Institute in 1933.
