This case study examines ICAO's dynamic law-making process and its legal and political ramifications. Focusing on the organization's law and practice in the areas of membership, legislation, settlement of disputes, and amendatory procedures, Professor Buergenthal explores the extent to which law affects ICAO's decision-making process, what the nature of that law is, and how it is developed.
