Some adjective/adverb issues

Some more adverbs lacking -ly:

again, already, besides, elsewhere, here, however, instead, likewise, near, never, now, often, soon, still, then, there, therefore, thus, today, tomorrow, very, yesterday

Some adverbs have dual forms, one with -ly, the other without:

They arrived *late*. [= not in time] Have you see him *lately*? [= recently] Stay *close*. [= near] I watched it *closely*. [= intently] I swam *deep* down. [= very deep] I studied it *deeply*. [= in great depth] I flew *direct* to London. [= without stopping] I'll be with him *directly*. [= immediately]

It works *fine*. [= very well] Slice the vegetables *finely*. [= into very thin slices] The kite went *high* in the sky. [= high up] I was *highly* impressed. [= very much]

We travelled *light*. [= with little luggage] They were *lightly* dressed. [= not wearing heavy clothes]

Some words ending in -ly can be both adjectives and adverbs:

A *yearly* visit. We went there *yearly*. And similarly: *monthly*, *daily*, *weekly*, *hourly*, *nightly*, *quarterly*

Adjectives ending in -ly tend not to take another -ly ending when turned into an adverb. Some examples:

A *friendly* wave. But not usually: I waved *friendlily*. Alternative phrasing is preferred, such as: I waved *in a friendly manner*.

And similarly: beastly, grisly, kindly, kingly, leisurely, lively, manly, masterly, saintly, sisterly, unsightly, womanly
