Many early modern plays were written by multiple authors. Like *King Edward III, Arden of Feversham* is sometimes attributed to William Shakespeare and Thomas Kyd (and, in *Arden's* case, also to Christopher Marlowe). As with King Edward III, the early title pages give no hint as to who might have written the play, and scholars rely on linguistic analysis and external clues to attribute the texts.
